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Strengthening the resilience of enterprises to promote sustainable and inclusive growth

CONTEXT OF THE PROJECT

Cameroon, like all countries in the world, had to deal with the COVID-19 health crisis from March 2020, with significant economic and social consequences. The implementation of restrictive measures to curb the spread of the disease, both globally and nationally, has led to a great slowdown in economic activities with significant consequences for enterprises and household living conditions. A survey carried out in May 2020 by the National Institute of Statistics (INS), with the support of the Ministry of Economy (MINEPAT) and the United Nations Development Programme (UNDP), revealed that nearly 90 percent of enterprises, mostly Small and Medium-sized Enterprises (SMEs) state that they have been affected by COVID-19, with the risks for some of them to cease their activities. It should be noted that the private sector in Cameroon is made up of SMEs that operate mainly in the tertiary sector, which makes them more vulnerable to internal and external shocks. Faced with this situation, the Government's response to the pandemic has materialised through the development and implementation of the Global Strategy for Response and Economic and Social Resilience.

Even though positive impacts on the economic recovery were already noticeable, the outbreak of the war in Ukraine came in as an additional shock that deteriorated the growth momentum that has been initiated, particularly for SMEs. In this context, the Government of Cameroon intends to continue and accelerate the implementation of the Global Pandemic Response Strategy, in particular pillar 2 on economic and financial resilience, through improving resilience and strengthening the economic recovery of affected SMEs. In collaboration with UNDP, the Government is committed to mobilising additional financing in the form of a loan from the Arab Bank for Economic Development in Africa (BADEA), as part of the **Private Sector Support Operation in Cameroon (OSSP-CMR).**



OBJECTIVES OF THE PROJECT

The project aims to strengthen the resilience of the private sector, especially SMEs, to the consequences of COVID-19 and other external shocks. On the other hand, to support the post-COVID recovery and the structural transformation of the Cameroonian economy.

BENEFICIARIES OF THE PROJECT

The Project focuses primarily on Very Small, Small and Medium-sized Enterprises (SMEs), as well as start-ups and innovative enterprises headed by women and young people.

OUTCOME 2 : The survival of SMEs is ensured

Six (6) intervention regions:



More than 1,200 target business promoters were sensitised to the opportunities that the project offers, and nearly 150 production facilities (rice, maize, sorghum, manioc, pineapples, onions, wheat, tomatoes, poultry, goats, pork, aquaculture, chocolate, wood, etc.) and **40 trade centres** were visited.

The deployment of an initiative entitled **"Productivity Acceleration Scheme** (DAP)", for the training and equipping of VSEs, SMEs and start-ups. The launch of studies to identify constraints linked to the business climate at regional and local level (CTD) and the development of operational response plans to constraints linked to the business climate in 10 pilot CTDs. **The studies are currently being finalised by five (05) consultants recruited.**
